



1. Research Employers & Roles

Take the time to look up the organizations attending and understand what they do and the roles that they have available. Arriving to a job fair with this information demonstrates focus and motivation to potential employers.

2. Print Resumes (CVs)

While some employers will offer alternative ways to provide your information, a resume includes almost everything they need to know about your contact information, work history, and education. Having multiple copies of your resume on-hand to give to employers is efficient and shows mindfulness.

3. Dress Appropriately

Most job fairs are considered casual events. Still, it's always better to arrive over-dressed than under-dressed. Business casual attire or higher is recommended.

4. Arrive On Time

Always plan to get to a job fair at least an hour before it is scheduled to end. This should allow for traffic and other transportation delays while still giving you enough time to meet with employers.

5. Be Aware

Job Fairs are often crowded, loud environments. Do your best to remain polite and focused through these challenges. This demonstrates professionalism to potential employers.

6. Follow Up

If there is contact information available for a role that you've applied to, follow up a week after the event. This reflects your interest in and commitment to the role to the potential employer.
